Ireland – Galway and Dublin & Scotland – Edinburgh/Glasgow**

**Travel dates:**

June 22-30, 2025.

**Itinerary:**

- June 22 Departure from Seattle airport.
- June 23 Arrival Dublin airport in morning. Transfer to Galway and check in to accommodation.
- June 24 Visit the stunning Cliffs of Moher, seeing the picturesque beauty of the Atlantic Ocean and the Aran Islands. Afterwards, transfer and check in to your accommodation in Dublin.
- June 25 Sightseeing Dublin – visit/tour Trinity College, Dublin Castle, Christ Church Cathedral, and St. Patrick's Cathedral. **Evening game vs. local team.**
- June 26 Visit Croke Park in Dublin for tour of Croke Park and GAA Museum, home of the Gaelic Games. **Evening game vs. a local team.**
- June 27 Transfer to your accommodation in Edinburgh/Glasgow.
- June 28 Sightseeing Edinburgh, visit Edinburgh Castle, St. Giles' Cathedral and Palace of Holyroodhouse. **Evening game vs. a local team.**
- June 29 Day trip to Loch Lomond or sightseeing Glasgow including Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum, The Riverside Museum of Transport and Travel, Glengoyne Distillery, Celtic Park and/or Ibrox Stadium.
- June 30 Transfer to London airport. Return flight.

### **Sport program included:**

We will arrange 3 games per team.

### **Accommodation and meals included:**

**Galway (June 23-24):** Accommodation at the University of Galway.

- Daily breakfast and dinner included.
- Located on campus including a wide variety of restaurants, cafes, and shops.
- Campus located less than a mile just outside Galway city center with easy access to shopping, restaurants, pubs, etc.
- Apartment style accommodations that include 4-6 bedrooms, fully equipped kitchens, spacious living areas, and free Wi-Fi.
- Variety of bedroom types, including single/single bedded rooms, with en-suite bathrooms available.

**Dublin (June 24-27):** 4-star Hotel accommodation in Dublin.

- Daily breakfast and dinner included.
- Hotel is in Dublin, approx. 7–8 miles from the city center.
- Accommodation in triple rooms (3 people per room – 2 double beds). Rooms all have private bathroom, phone, satellite TV and free Wi-Fi.
- Double rooms are available at a supplement of \$40.00 per person per night and single rooms are available at a supplement of \$145.00 per person per night.
- Be aware that hotel rooms/beds are smaller than we are used to in the USA.
- The hotel has a lounge, reception, and bar.

**Glasgow/Edinburgh (June 27-30):** 4-star Hotel accommodation in Glasgow.

- Daily breakfast and dinner included.
- The hotel is in Glasgow, approx. 8–9 miles from the city center.
- Accommodation in triple rooms (3 people per room – 3 single beds). Rooms all have private bathrooms, phone, satellite TV and free Wi-Fi.
- Double rooms are available at a supplement of \$15.00 per person per night and single rooms are available at a supplement of \$60.00 per person per night.
- Be aware that hotel rooms/beds are smaller than we are used to in the USA.
- The hotel has a lounge, restaurant, and bar.

### **Ground transportation included:**

During your entire stay a private bus will be available exclusively for your group at each destination – 10 hours a day.

**Local guide services included:**

A local tour assistant will be assigned to be exclusively with your group full-time each day during your stay in each destination to provide you with any assistance when necessary, and help plan or amend your daily schedule as needed.

## **SIGHTSEEING IN DUBLIN AND SURROUNDINGS**

### **1) TRINITY COLLEGE AND COLLEGE GREEN**

Price: Adults \$16.00 per person (\$43.00 to add the Book of Kells and Old Library)

Trinity College is probably the best spot to kick off your Dublin tour. It's at the heart of the capital, packed full of incredible history, and it's the oldest university in Ireland having been founded in 1592 by Queen Elizabeth I. Occupying an enviable 40-acre site, Trinity retains some of its ancient seclusion of cobbled squares, gardens, and parks and is famed throughout the world for its collection of great treasures. These include, on permanent exhibition, the 9th century illuminated manuscript, the Book of Kells, the Books of Durrow and Armagh, and an ancient Irish harp. The priceless artefacts are displayed in the Treasury and the awe-inspiring 18th-century Long Room, which houses more than 200,000 of Trinity's oldest books and hosts regular literary exhibitions.

### **2) NATIONAL GALLERY OF IRELAND**

Price: Free Admission.

A right turn at the end of Kildare Street will bring you to the National Gallery of Ireland with entrances on Clare Street and Merrion Square West. Housing the finest collection of Irish art in the world alongside an outstanding collection of European art from the Middle Ages to the present day, this is a must-see while in the capital. The gallery opened in 1864 with wings being added in 1903, 1968, and most recently, 2002. Collections include the Yeats Museum, seven rooms devoted to Irish art, Italian Painters, the Shaw Room, and Baroque Room. The gallery, which is spread over four levels, regularly hosts impressive temporary exhibitions, and there's an excellent café popular with locals and visitors alike.

### **3) PHOENIX PARK AND DUBLIN ZOO**

Price: Seniors \$22.00, Adults \$28.00, Under 16s \$21.00, Under 3s Free.

An 18-minute walk from Collins Barracks is Dublin Zoo in Phoenix Park. This is the largest enclosed urban park in Europe, some 1,750 acres, which is surprising given that Dublin is a relatively small capital city. Hundreds of deer roam the parkland, the President of Ireland's official residence is here along with Deerfield, a beautiful 18th-century property home to the American Ambassador to Ireland. There's a Visitors Centre located close to a 17th-century tower house, Ashtown Castle, for those wishing to find out more about the park and its environment. At the far Castleknock Gate end and on some 78 acres stands stately Farmleigh House dating from the 1800s and purchased by the Irish state from the Guinness family in 1999.

### **4) THE GUINNESS STOREHOUSE**

Price: Adult \$39.00 – 10% Discount for groups of 26 or more.

It takes a LOT to become iconic, but Guinness has done it. The "Black Stuff" may be famous the world over, but this slow-settling porter started off life in St James's Gate at the heart of old Dublin. Back in 1759, an enterprising brewer by the name of Arthur Guinness took out a 9,000-year lease on the brewery here for an annual rent of £45. A couple of centuries later, the Storehouse was born. Built in the style of the Chicago School of Architecture 1904, it was originally used as a fermentation house. Today its Ireland's number one visitor attraction – a gleaming, multimedia exhibition on everything from retro advertising to the craft of brewing, topped off with a pint in the 360-degree Gravity Bar. When you get there, don't forget to raise your glass to Arthur's wonderful creation!

## **SIGHTSEEING IN EDINBURGH AND GLASGOW 2024**

### **EDINBURGH CASTLE**

Edinburgh Castle is a historic fortress which dominates the skyline of the city of Edinburgh, Scotland, from its position on the Castle Rock. Archaeologists have established human occupation of the rock since at least the Iron Age. As one of the most important strongholds in the Kingdom of Scotland, Edinburgh Castle was involved in many historical conflicts from the Wars of Scottish Independence in the 14th century to the Jacobite rising of 1745. Research undertaken in 2014 identified 26 sieges in its 1,100-year-old history, giving it a claim to having been "the most besieged place in Great Britain and one of the most attacked in the world".

### **HOLYROOD PALACE:**

Prince Charles Edward Stuart, better known as Bonnie Prince Charlie, brought the Palace of Holyroodhouse to life in 1745 when he set up court for six weeks and the Palace became the symbolic residence of the Stuart Prince in his Scottish capital. Today, the Queen of England take residency in the palace for Holyrood week, which is usually the end of June into the first week of July.

Minimum of 15 people and currently a maximum of 30 people  
Adult = \$31.00 per person

### **LOCH LOMOND:**

Loch Lomond is a freshwater Scottish loch which crosses the Highland Boundary Fault. It is the largest inland stretch of water in Great Britain by surface area. The loch contains many islands, including Inchmurrin, the largest fresh-water island in the British Isles. Loch Lomond is a popular leisure destination and is now part of Trossachs National Park which was established in 2002.
